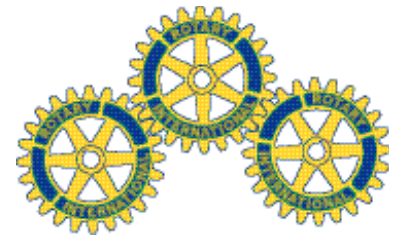

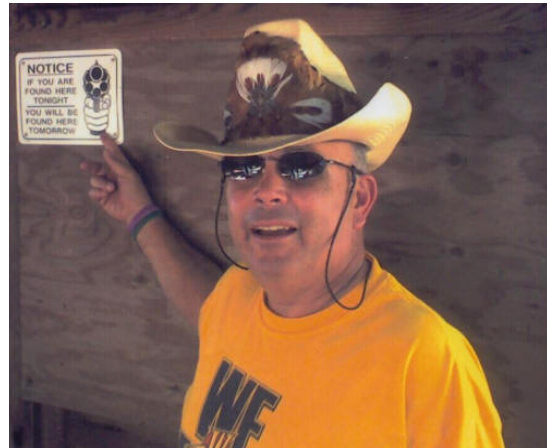
BRIDGE SAFETY ON CALIFORNIA ROADS

November 8, 1970: The day the Mariani family—Tom, his wife and three children, and their WW Bug—were knocked off a bridge on US 101 six miles south of Eureka during a 7.2 earthquake. Four decades later, the rebuilding of San Francisco's Doyle Drive and the major repairs of the Bay Bridge are still past due. I would like to start this by saying that I met our new sheriff, Steve Frietas, a few years ago when he was the Chief of Police for Windsor. Steve has been and IS an open-minded law enforcement officer. I have seen him approach people and problems where others have chosen not to do so. Many of us have heard the clichés—a no-nonsense type of guy, actions speak louder than words. The majority of the times it's just that a cliché but every time I have met with Steve (on the same side of the metal bars) he has been just that. Anyway Sheriff Steve Frietas was our guest speaker this week and was able to clue us in on how and why he became (or even decided to run for) Sheriff of Sonoma County. When he was first asked he thought that it was an outlandish idea, but after talking first with his wife and his peers he decided to run... a proud moment in his life. But not

as proud as when he became a father. He admits is much prouder of his family and frankly his kids don't care that he is the sheriff...they just want to know if he will play with them. He left time for plenty of questions, and that's what he got from our club— plenty of questions:

Q: Do you think that the 25 percent reduction being asked of your department is fair to your Department?

A: I cannot answer if it is fair to my department or not, all county departments are having to adjust their budgets. That's just the way it is, and I will do the best that I can with what I am given.

Q: Do you share the same radio frequency as other police departments in Sonoma County?

A: Yes except for Rohnert Park, we can all talk on Sheriff 1 settings

Q: Why do we not have the same program as Texas has for volunteers within the Sheriff's department?

A: We actually do, we have about 100 volunteers currently from mailroom to traffic control.

Q: Is there ever going to be another Sheriff's Citizen Academy?

A: It was a great program, but with the latest budget cuts we don't see that in the near future again.

Q: How will releasing some criminals from prison affect Sonoma County?

A: Due to lawsuits and state and federal

mandates they will be releasing criminals from jails/prisons early. We hope that if they came from Sonoma County they will be released to Sonoma County, hopefully with funding.

Q: Don't we have laws that are just overboard in penalties in other words making mountains out of mole hills, and because of that some people can't get jobs for example like having a misdemeanor on their records?

A: Very few might be, but for the majority, some things that were considered felonies are now misdemeanors, and so forth. A misdemeanor conviction might hinder someone from getting a job, but it depends on the type of job.
