

CHILDRENS NUTCRACKER CHRISTMAS

Every Holiday Season for more years than most of us have been Rotarians, more than a hundred students from local elementary schools attend our Rotary Club's traditional Nutcracker Christmas party, sponsored by our Rotary Club and made possible by club volunteers, who shop for gifts, solicit donations, wrap presents, and pitch in to make this a special Christmas for appreciative kids for whom the evening is often a once-in-a-lifetime experience. Certainly the first opportunity for most of these students to experience the enchantment, the wonder, and sensory overload of ballet, classical music, and fairy tales, brought to life before their eyes. The Nutcracker is two-act Russian ballet that premiered almost two centuries ago in St. Petersburg the week before Christmas. The musical score by Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky has become one of his most famous compositions. Since the mid-20th Century, the ballet has enjoyed enormous popularity, especially in the United States, and is as much Christmas tradition as colored lights, and presents, and that jolly old elf named Santa.

The children's Christmas experience begins early Saturday afternoon, December 17th, when busses collect the kids and deliver them to the Spreckels Theatre. The dancers

are from the Santa Rosa Dance Theater, the choreography and music is classical and Russian, and the impact on the children is palpable as they gather after the performance for home-baked cookies, juice, and a visit from Old St. Nick. The presents are marked with individual names. Santa and his elves give each child their own gift, one-by-one. Some classes open their gifts on the spot; others take them back to school for their own class party.

FEATURED PROGRAM

Past President Ray Dorfman, our ubiquitous Brooklyn transplant, introduced another Brooklyn transplant, Lowell Cohn, sports writer/columnist for the Santa Rosa Press Democrat for the last sixteen years, as our guest speaker. Lowell's 30-plus years of "hobnobbing with the intelligentsia" of the sports world has honed his insight into an array of sports associations, such as the San Francisco 49ers, the Oakland Raiders football teams and the San

Francisco Giants and Oakland A's baseball teams and the Warriors basketball team, to name a few. In a turnabout, Lowell was on the receiving end of a Q&A session with our Club. 30 years of insight was shared with us in a span of 30 minutes as we peppered him with questions on all things sports. We discovered Lowell to be a fan of boxing, a sport that harkens back to his early days in journalism. He named several Brooklyn Dodger players—such as Jackie Robinson—as his sports heroes. Today, Lowell doesn't see heroes in the younger generation of players, who seem to be more focused on self interests, i.e. money, money and maybe more money.

Lowell had good things to say about Jim Harbaugh, the new 49ers coach, and quarterback Alex Smith. His comments were objective, specific and detailed. Coach Harbaugh is somewhat of an enigma to Lowell (that may be an understatement based on how tough it is to glean useful information from the coach during interviews). Maybe the secrecy issue is meant to protect against giving other teams valuable information about perceived weaknesses—(editor's comment).

Lowell is not a fan of the BCS (Bowl Championship Series) of college football and the idea of scholar-athletes seems to be a joke, except for maybe Stanford or Cal players. At this point in his career, he does not favor the move of the SF 49ers to Santa Clara, though it still may be a convenience for the team and many fans. After all, they are the San Francisco 49ers, not the Santa Clara 49ers.

Lowell is opinionated (as he should be), has in-depth insight into sports and isn't afraid to state his case and back it up with examples. Whether you agree or not with his conclusions misses the point. The point is: Has he presented enough perspective and analysis for the reader to understand the issues and develop a personal opinion about them. Even the sports dudes among us today probably enjoyed this lively presentation.
