RECOGNITIONS

Queen Jeanne Levin, his wife and club member (who preceded him as Rotary President) ratted him out for having re-tired as President of the Sonoma County Taxpayers Association after 11 years. Fred miserly agreed to donate \$25 to the Club's Foundation.

PROGRAM

Program chair Matt Everson introduced Ted Robinson, retired Lt. US Navy (and another New York Football Giants fan). In the early days of World War II, Robinson was chief radar officer for a squadron of P.T. (Patrol Torpedo) Boats, operating 30 to 50 miles behind Japanese lines in the remote South Pacific and bunking for 21/2 months-in separate cots-with a future U.S. president during their 365 days on a series of suicide missions (but who was counting?). "Robby" Robinson was in our neighborhood (visiting his Bear Cub grandson), and regaled us with recollections of his time in the Navy with Lt. John F. Kennedy.

Given their mission—to attack the battleships, destroyers, and cruisers of the Japanese Navy with plowing through the waves in small plywood speedboats, armed only with machine guns, torpedoes, and high-powered engines (but no heavy armament or heavy weapons). Their base was a small scrap of semi-dry land hundreds of miles from allied support, with Japan's modern fighters and bombers in complete control of the skies—they hid during daytime and ventured out only in complete darkness. No wonder Ted Robinson called it "suicide work".

Early in the war, Jack Kennedy had been assigned heavy duty in Newport, Rhode Island, to an LMD—"Large Mahogany Desk—until he volunteered for the experimental P.T. Boats in the remote Pacific. Kennedy and Ro-binson were not assigned to the same boat, but Ted was the officer who was given the coconut that JFK carved (after a Japanese cruiser sliced his PT boat in half) saying: "11 still alive -send help" brought to their base by a native islander. Ted commanded the PT boat that went 70 miles behind enemy lines to rescue JFK and the sur-vivors of his crew.

In addition to President Kennedy, another auspicious squadron officer was college football star and future



Jus-tice of the U.S. Supreme Court, Whizzer White. The Navy officers in the squadron were mainly Ivy League col-lege graduates. Not so the enlisted swabbies who

operational. Ted recalled that the mechanics probably graduated from D.H.C, which stood for Detroit House of Corrections!

Given the lack of attractiveness and appeal of even the island's scantily-clad native women, Ted recounted he and JFK spent much of their time discussing their mothers, Rose Kennedy in particular and JFK's developmen-tally-disabled sister. Later however, after watching movie star Veronica Lake in a film aboard a US battleship Jack commented, "wouldn't it be wonderful to have a date with a star like that!" Ted recalled that JFK was par-ticularly religious and he asked JFK to put in a good word for a Protestant when JFK did his daily prayers on his rosary. Not too surprising, considering the dangerous work they were doing and where they were based—of the squadron's 15 boats, only three were still operational at the end of their year's tour of duty.

According to Robinson, Jack Kennedy did not exhibit any future Presidential aspirations or qualities except that when he piloted his boat to the base, 190 Japanese planes welcomed him and escorted him in. The display of Japanese air power that day was in honor of the arrival at the island that day of Japanese Admiral Yamamoto: the same day that U.S. fighters ambushed the admiral's transport plane and he was shot and killed. JFK did have a knack of making friends with anybody however, especially the chief of the village on Florida Island. Accord-ing to Robinson, Kennedy was very smart and curious. When not attacking Japanese ships, JFK whiled away his time wondering why the ingredients of Baby Ruth bars were different than Hershey bars.

The native islanders had no access to medical care at that time, not even a PPO or a HMO! Ted heard JFK re-mark that "Some day, some day a rich country like America should help people like this". Ted thinks that that was seed for the Peace Corps, President Kennedy's first major project after his inauguration in 1961.

Ted expressed nothing but admiration for Kennedy's courage and bravery, recounting that even though their P.T. boats never ventured out of hiding at their swamp base in daylight, JFK was the only officer who volun-teered to take his boat

30 miles across open water in the daytime to rescue Marines survivors who had attacked the Japanese airbase on a nearby island. (PT boats never ventured out of their swamp base in daytime because of their vulnerability to attack from the air by Japanese airplanes.)
