CLEAN WATER

A change is taking place in the way Rotarians approach water and sanitation programs. No organization—not even Rotary with its 33,000 clubs and over 1.2 million Rotarians. We need leverage to be successful...the leverage that comes from working with others who share our goals, such as the International H2O Collaboration, an alliance between Rotary International and USAID. Rotary Clubs in Ghana, the Dominican Republic, and the Philippines are working together to bring safe water and sanitation to hundreds of communities and schools.

In Uganda, a very successful relationship between World Vision and the Rotary Club of Gulu is improving the lives of up to 50,000 villagers through a joint "bore-hole" and behavior change program. The World Vision project leader says, "Having local Rotarians explain the importance of hygiene and hand-washing is much more compelling than when presented by visiting experts from outside the country."

As water, sanitation, and hygiene programs become more complex it is unlikely that any Rotary club has the range of resources and skills to ensure a sustainable program. Success depends increasingly on collaboration with organizations having complementary resources, funding, technology, local contacts, knowledge of the culture, and expertise. Reaching out is essential if Rotary is to take its rightful place at the humanitarian table. What a video about Rotary's work in this area of focus.
