

# SCHOLARSHIP AND FINANCIAL AID

- \$2.6 million in Frank P. and Polly O'Meara Doyle Scholarship funds
- \$1.5 million in SRJC Foundation scholarships
- Emergency Grants:
  - \$250K allocated to purchase loaner laptops for students
  - \$330K from donations directly to 570 students with community's help
  - \$10M to more than 6,000 students since spring of 2020 including federal and state grants
  - Expanded Doyle scholarship to part-time and international students for the first time in SRJC history
- Created Sawubona Black Student Scholarship; more than \$85,000 in the fund and growing
- Provided fresh produce, pantry items and \$50 grocery cards to more than 1,400 students since fall 2020 through partnership with Redwood Empire Food Bank
- Loaned more than 1100 laptops and nearly 800 hotspots



# LEVERAGING COMMUNITY AND GRANT SUPPORT

- \$1m grant from Kaiser Permanente for Student Housing
- \$2,8m five-year grant from US Department of Education; Title V HSI (Hispanic Serving Institution) which began in October 2020.
- \$4,6m five-year grant from US Department of Education; HSI beginning October 1, 2021.
- \$500,000 in funds from The Sonoma County Board of Supervisors for fire prevention programs.
- \$8m over 10 years, or \$805,000 annually, for mental health services at SRJC from Measure O.
- Over \$7.1m award from US Department of Commerce for Construction Training Center, Petaluma.
- \$6m infusion from PG&E for the Wildfire Prevention Program
- \$15m from the State for Student Housing



## COVID-19 IMPACT

- Pandemic had a negative impact on enrollment.
- Students identified following themes as negative impacts on enrollment due to the pandemic:
  - Financial Problems
  - Housing Insecurity
  - Difficulty Engaging in Online Instruction
  - Mental Health
- Those themes consistently prominent with our students of color, first generation students, and students with financial need.






